Senator Uresti offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Senate of the State of Texas is pleased to welcome the citizens of Culberson County who have come to the State Capitol to celebrate Culberson County Day; and

WHEREAS, Located in the Trans-Pecos region of West Texas, Culberson County covers 3,815 square miles of fairly level to mountainous land, with elevations ranging from 3,000 feet to 8,751 feet on Guadalupe Peak, the highest point in the state and a major tourist attraction in Guadalupe Mountains National Park; and

WHEREAS, A Folsom point found in the Guadalupe Mountains is evidence of human occupation of the area some 12,000 years ago; the Apaches, the area's most famous indigenous inhabitants, arrived about 600 years ago; the forbidding terrain and the presence of the Apaches deterred most Spanish exploration and settlement; and

WHEREAS, By the middle of the 19th century, new routes were being sought to connect central and eastern Texas with El Paso and California, and the 1849 gold rush increased the demand; settlement in the area began in earnest with the completion of the Texas and Pacific Railway in the 1880s and the growth of ranching in the area; Culberson County was created in 1911 from El Paso County and named after David B. Culberson; the county was organized and Van Horn was named its county seat in 1912; and

WHEREAS, The extraction of minerals has long been important in Culberson County, which has yielded copper, silver, molybdenum, gypsum, talc, and many other minerals; oil was discovered in 1953; the people of Culberson County have long realized the benefits of attracting visitors to the area, and tourism has become increasingly important in the local economy; and

WHEREAS, Culberson County Day at the State Capitol provides an opportunity to honor the county's rich past and its contributions to the history of this state; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 81st Legislature, hereby recognize Culberson County Day and extend best wishes to the delegation from Culberson County for a memorable visit to the State Capitol; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared for the citizens of Culberson County as a memento of this special day.

WHEREAS, The smallest county in the Permian Basin of West Texas, Loving County is bounded on the west by the Pecos River and on the north by New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, Loving County was created in 1887; it was carved out of Tom Green County and remained attached to Reeves County for judicial purposes; it was named for Oliver Loving, an early Texas cattleman; the county was organized in 1893, and the town of Mentone, which was laid out 12 miles north of the present Mentone, was named the county seat; and

WHEREAS, The state deorganized Loving County in 1897, and Mentone was abandoned; after the discovery of oil in the region in the 1920s, the town of Ramsey was born, which led to the second organization of Loving County in 1931; Ramsey was renamed Mentone and became the county seat; and

WHEREAS, Loving County consists of 671 square miles of flat desert terrain with a few rolling hills stretching over calichified bedrock; Mentone is the only town in the county; area wildlife includes quail, deer, javelinas, bobcats, coyotes, and armadillos; and

WHEREAS, Over the years, the county's economy has relied on oil and gas production and the unimproved land has been used for cattle grazing; and

WHEREAS, Although the area is sparsely populated, the residents of Loving County are members of a unique community, and Loving County Day is an excellent opportunity to recognize these rugged Texans and pay tribute to their county's role in the rich history of this state; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 81st Legislature, hereby express appreciation to the people of Loving County for their contributions to our state and extend best wishes to them as they celebrate Loving County Day at the Capitol; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared in honor of Loving County.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 53

The Presiding Officer laid before the Senate the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Proud residents of West Texas are gathering in Austin to celebrate West Texas Day at the State Capitol on March 31, 2009; and

WHEREAS, With its epic history—a chronicle of Native Americans contesting for the land with frontier soldiers and settlers, of cow towns and cattle drives supplanting immense herds of buffalo, of oilmen and roughnecks developing the vast petroleum and gas fields of the Permian Basin—this famous region encompasses much of what people most readily associate with the Lone Star State; and

WHEREAS, The scenic wonders of West Texas include, in the northern reaches, the primordial grasslands of the Llano Estacado, the imposing Caprock escarpment, and the spectacular Palo Duro Canyon, while to the south lie striking landscapes of mountains, deserts, and the steeply cut canyons of the Rio Grande; and

WHEREAS, Citizens of West Texas cherish the land and the rich heritage that have shaped them and take pride in the communities and institutions they have established; among their most important creations are many fine institutions of higher learning, including Abilene Christian University and McMurry University in Abilene, West Texas A&M University in Canyon, Texas Tech University, the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, and Lubbock Christian University in Lubbock, Midland College in Midland, The University of Texas of the Permian Basin and Odessa College in Odessa, and Angelo State University in San Angelo; and

WHEREAS, Serving the people of West Texas are a number of modern urban centers; Abilene, established in the 1880s on the line of the Texas and Pacific Railway, has grown from a celebrated cattle town into a thriving city of 115,000; a center for ranching and the petroleum industry, it is also the site of Dyess Air Force Base, home to the B-1 bomber and its crews and a staging area for troops fighting in Iraq and Afghanistan; in 2002, the city gained a dramatic addition to its downtown area with the opening of Frontier Texas! a six-acre, state-of-the-art tourist complex that also serves as the starting point for the Texas Forts Trail, a 650-mile heritage tour through 29 counties; and

WHEREAS, Located in the heart of the Panhandle and at the center of the largest natural gas field in the world, Amarillo has built its prosperity on gas, petroleum, agriculture, and cattle; in addition, the city has several major defense plants, including Pantex and Bell Helicopter Textron; residents enjoy such cultural amenities as opera,

ballet, symphonic music, theater at the Globe News Center for the Performing Arts, and the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, while the nearby Cadillac Ranch ranks as one of the nation's truly unique tourist attractions; and

WHEREAS, Lubbock, a center for agribusiness, distribution, and manufacturing, is also widely known for its outstanding medical facilities, for its comprehensive National Ranching Heritage Center, and for a renowned archeological site, the Lubbock Lake Landmark; the birthplace, moreover, of rock and roll legend Buddy Holly, Lubbock has played an influential role in the growth of Texas music, nurturing such artists as Waylon Jennings, Joe Ely, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, and Butch Hancock; and

WHEREAS, Long identified with the oil business, Midland continues to be an administrative and financial center for that industry; its cultural attractions include the Petroleum Museum, the Museum of the Southwest, and the American Airpower Heritage Museum, a world-famous collection of vintage World War II aircraft that was initially developed by the Commemorative Air Force; and

WHEREAS, Odessa claims the distinction of being home to the largest inland petrochemical complex in the world; another facet of the community's identity is reflected in the venerable Sandhills Stock Show and Rodeo, the first rodeo of the season for the nearly one thousand men and women competing on the tour of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association; the city also boasts a replica of Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, the Ellen Noel Art Museum, the Parker House Ranching Museum, and the Presidential Museum, the only museum in the United States solely dedicated to the office of the presidency; and

WHEREAS, San Angelo's colorful frontier history lives on at Fort Concho, one of the best preserved forts in the country and now a national historic landmark; at one time the largest range cattle shipping station in the United States, San Angelo continues to be a national leader in the processing and shipping of wool and mohair, while it also benefits from a highly diversified industrial sector; Goodfellow Air Force Base, established at San Angelo in 1940, further contributes to the city's economy, as well as to the nation's defense; and

WHEREAS, With its striking vistas, abundant natural resources, and energetic, hardworking people, West Texas is engaged in building a future that promises to be as dynamic and exciting as its storied past; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the 81st Legislature of the State of Texas hereby recognize March 31, 2009, as West Texas Day at the State Capitol and extend sincere best wishes for an enjoyable and memorable visit to all those who have traveled here for this special occasion.

SENATE BILL 847 ON SECOND READING

On motion of Senator Averitt and by unanimous consent, the regular order of business was suspended to take up for consideration **SB 847** at this time on its second reading:

SB 847, Relating to applicability of fee exemptions for military personnel and their children to certain course fees charged by public technical institutes and public state colleges.

The bill was read second time and was passed to engrossment by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the passage to engrossment.

SENATE BILL 847 ON THIRD READING

Senator Averitt moved that Senate Rule 7.18 and the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended and that **SB 847** be placed on its third reading and final passage.

The motion prevailed by the following vote: Yeas 30, Nays 1.

Nays: Wentworth.

Reason for Vote

Senator Wentworth submitted the following reason for vote on suspension of the Constitutional Three-day Rule:

I cast a "No" vote on the procedural motion to suspend the Constitutional Rule requiring that bills be read on three several days in order to take up and consider SB 847, because in my judgment no circumstance exists in this case to justify the extraordinary act of suspending a requirement of the Texas Constitution. The suspension of this Constitutional Rule has the direct and immediate effect of denying the people of Texas knowledge and notice of the passage of this measure until it has already been finally passed on third reading. Were we to have followed the requirement of the Texas Constitution, third reading and a vote on SB 847 would have occurred on the next legislative day, allowing for Texans to have learned through news reports of our second reading vote exactly what we had tentatively passed. Third reading and a vote on the next legislative day would also have allowed our professional staff an opportunity overnight to make sure any amendments passed on second reading are technically correct.

SENATE BILL 1278 ON SECOND READING

Senator Huffman moved to suspend the regular order of business to take up for consideration **SB 1278** at this time on its second reading:

SB 1278, Relating to the authority of a judge to suspend the imposition of a sentence and place a defendant on community supervision.

The motion prevailed.

Senator Watson asked to be recorded as voting "Nay" on suspension of the regular order of business.

The bill was read second time and was passed to engrossment by a viva voce vote.
